A GOOD SHEPHERD, A FAITHFUL SERVANT, AND AN EVERLASTING BUILDER
THE SEND-OFF AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF REV. KWAKU BOAMAH AT KING'S COURT CHAPEL ASSEMBLIES OF GOD ON AUGUST 30, 2026

*I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith."
(2 Timothy 4:7)*

A Journey of Faith, Service and Sacrifice
Every generation is blessed with people whose lives become living testimonies of faith, sacrifice and service. Some pass through a place and leave footprints; others pass through a place and build foundations upon which generations continue to stand. Rev. Kwaku Boamah belongs to the latter.

Since 2009, Rev. Kwaku Boamah has served as the Pastor of King's Court Chapel, Assemblies of God, and as the AGCM Campus Pastor. His years of ministry have been characterized by a quiet but unmistakable commitment to God, His Church and His people. His ministry has not merely been about occupying a pulpit. It has been about building people, building families, building institutions, building communities and, ultimately, building the Kingdom of God. As the African proverb says: "If you want to go fast, go alone; if you want to go far, go together."

Rev. Boamah's journey has demonstrated the power of partnership. At the heart of that partnership has been his beloved wife, Mrs. Joyce Boamah, affectionately known as Sofomaame Joyce, and their children. Together, they have given themselves to the work of ministry, often making sacrifices that may never fully appear in official records but remain deeply engraved in the hearts of those they have served.



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From a Rental Place to a House of Worship. One of the most visible testimonies of Rev. Boamah's tenure has been the transformation of King's Court Chapel from a church worshipping in a rented facility into a congregation with its own ultra-modern church building. This achievement represents much more than bricks, mortar and concrete. It represents vision, faith, perseverance, collective sacrifice and prayer. The journey from a rental facility to a permanent place of worship required courage to dream beyond the present and faith to believe in what was not yet visible. The Scripture declares:

"Except the LORD build the house, they labour in vain that build it." Psalm 127:1 Today, the church building stands as a physical testimony to what God can accomplish through people who are willing to trust Him and work diligently. The work has not ended there. Under his leadership, the construction of the Missions House, now approximately 75% complete, has further demonstrated his commitment to missions and the long-term development of the Church. For Rev. Boamah, ministry has never been merely about today's needs.

He has consistently sought to leave something for tomorrow's generation. A Pastor Who Walked among His People The ministry of Rev. Boamah has also been characterised by personal contact with members. He has regularly visited members, shared in their joys and sorrows, and extended practical support to those in need. Widows and widowers of the Church have benefited from regular donations, reflecting a ministry that understands that Christianity must move beyond words into action.



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The Bible teaches:

"Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction." James 1:27 This has been one of the quiet signatures of his ministry: seeing people, remembering people and caring for people. Building Bridges—Literally and Figuratively

Perhaps one of the most remarkable examples of Rev. Boamah's community-oriented ministry is the construction of a bridge connecting the church and the surrounding community, at a cost of more than GH¢50,000. A bridge is a powerful symbol. It connects what was separated. It makes movement possible. It brings people closer. It creates access. And in many ways, this physical bridge reflects the kind of ministry Rev. Boamah has pursued throughout his pastoral years—a ministry of connection.

He has sought to connect the Church with the community, the young with the old, the congregation with its leaders, and the spiritual with the practical realities of everyday life. There is an African proverb saying: A single bracelet does not jingle." Great things are rarely accomplished by one person alone. Rev. Boamah's achievements have been the fruit of God-given vision combined with the sacrifice and cooperation of members, leaders, families and friends.

A Church That Serves, Learns and Grows

Under his pastoral leadership, King's Court Chapel has experienced a broad range of programmes designed to minister to the whole person.

These have included programmes focusing on:

- Marriage and relationships
- Missions and evangelism
- Prayer and fasting
- Medical seminars
- Legal seminars
- Spiritual growth and Christian discipleship

Such initiatives demonstrate an understanding that the Church must minister to people not only from the pulpit but also in the realities of family life, health, law, relationships, work and community.

The Apostle Paul instructed Timothy:

"Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine." 2 Timothy 4:2

Rev. Boamah has sought to remain faithful to that charge.

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The church building.
The Missions House.
The bridge.
The Church bus.
The programmes.
The seminars.
The donations.
The Monday morning preaching.
But his true legacy goes deeper.
His legacy is in the widow who received help.
It is in the member who was visited during a difficult season.
It is in the young minister who received guidance.
It is in the couple whose marriage was strengthened.
It is in the soul that encountered Christ through his preaching.
It is in the community that gained access through the bridge.
It is in the child who saw Christian service demonstrated through the life of a pastor and his family.
It is in the people who learned that ministry is not about titles but about service.
Jesus said:
"For even the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many."
— Mark 10:45 That is the heart of pastoral ministry.
A Philosopher's Perspective on Legacy
The philosopher and statesman Marcus Aurelius wrote about the importance of living a life that benefits others. In essence, his philosophy reminds us that human beings are made for cooperation and service.
And that principle resonates deeply with the story of Rev. Boamah.
For a life of ministry is not ultimately about how much one has accumulated, but about how many lives have been touched.
The African worldview similarly teaches that:
"When an old man dies, a library burns to the ground."
But when a servant of God completes a season of ministry, perhaps another picture is equally appropriate:
When a faithful shepherd leaves, the sheep remember the paths by which they were led. Rev. Boamah leaves behind paths of faith, service, sacrifice, teaching, compassion and community transformation.

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In the broader story of Rev. Boamah's ministry, the bus represents movement—a Church that refuses to remain stationary.

The Challenges Along the Way

No meaningful journey is without challenges.

Rev. Boamah's tenure has also encountered difficult realities, including the frequent transfer of committed members, opportunities for members to travel abroad, and high attrition.

These realities can be painful for a pastor.

A pastor invests in people, watches them grow, prays with them, teaches them, celebrates their progress and walks with them through difficult seasons. When they eventually relocate or move on, there can be a sense of loss.

Yet a shepherd understands that the flock ultimately belongs to God.

As the Psalmist declares:

"The earth is the LORD'S, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein."

— Psalm 24:1

Perhaps some of those who left King's Court Chapel were not losses but deployments—people who carried something they received under Rev. Boamah's ministry into other cities, countries, churches and communities.

The African proverb says:

"The tree does not move from its place, but its fruits travel far."

A pastor may remain in one place, while the people he has nurtured carry his influence to places he may never personally visit.

Daddy: The Man Behind the Pulpit

Beyond the title Reverend, there is the man whom many affectionately call Daddy.

Those who have interacted closely with Rev. Boamah know him as a man who is calm, reserved, gentle and loving.

His demeanour is not characterised by unnecessary noise or flamboyance. His strength often expresses itself through quietness.

There is wisdom in the words:

"Still waters run deep."

His calm disposition has often communicated a message of stability, while his gentleness has made him approachable.

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He demonstrates love without discrimination and seeks to treat people with dignity irrespective of their background or status.

The Apostle Paul reminds us:

"Let all your things be done with charity."

— 1 Corinthians 16:14

For Rev. Boamah, love has not simply been a theological concept. It has been a practical posture toward people.

Sofomaame Joyce: The Woman Beside the Shepherd

No story of Rev. Kwaku Boamah's ministry would be complete without paying tribute to the woman and children who have stood beside him.

Mrs. Joyce Boamah—Sofomaame Joyce—is more than a pastor's wife. She has been a companion, partner, encourager, caregiver and fellow labourer in ministry. She is his "flesh of his flesh and bone of his bone," walking beside him through the demands and sacrifices of pastoral ministry.

Her contribution has often been expressed in practical ways.

She personally purchases items for donations to women during childbirth and personally sponsored her pastoral training at Assemblies of God Theological seminary-Saltpond. Permit me to address her well, Rev. Mrs. Joyce Boamah, Ayekoo. She travels considerable distances—from Hohoe to the Church—simply to participate in programmes organised by the Women's Ministry.

She has demonstrated that ministry is not always performed from a pulpit.

Sometimes ministry is found in a bag of provisions, a visit, a journey, a phone call, a prayer, a smile or a quiet sacrifice that nobody applauds.

The Scripture says:

"Two are better than one; because they have a good reward for their labour."

— Ecclesiastes 4:9

The ministry of Rev. Kwaku and Mrs. Joyce Boamah has been a testimony to this truth.

Behind the public achievements of the pastor has stood a woman whose own sacrifices deserve recognition.

And behind the woman has stood a family that has shared the demands of pastoral life.
